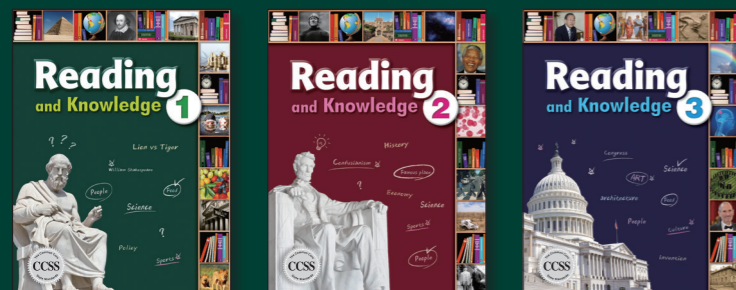

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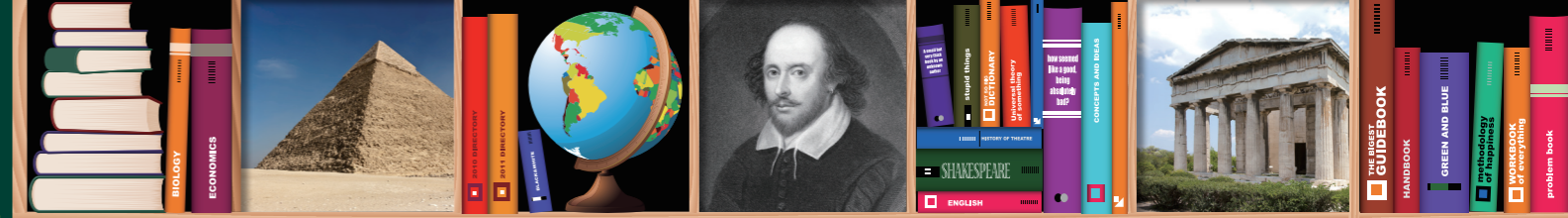

DIFFERENT JOBS AROUND THE WORLD

What do you want to be when you grow up? This may be a hard question to answer, but there are many jobs in the world. People want to be doctors, teachers, police officers, and even soccer players. There are some **uncommon** jobs as well.

If you like being outdoors, then maybe you could be a golf ball diver. There are lakes on most golf courses. Naturally, many golfers hit their balls into the water. Your job would be to swim to the bottom and get the balls. Another unique job is being a dog food tester. Dogs can't tell us how dog food tastes, so a person has to try it first.

The testers decide if dogs will like it. Snake milkers have a **dangerous** job. They capture **poisonous** snakes and get **venom** from them. This venom is used as medicine to treat people that are bitten by snakes.

Surprisingly, there are many unique jobs to choose from. Working an **ordinary** job isn't for everyone. Maybe you think some of these **occupations** are weird. But remember, the world is a big place, and we need people willing to work all sorts of different jobs.

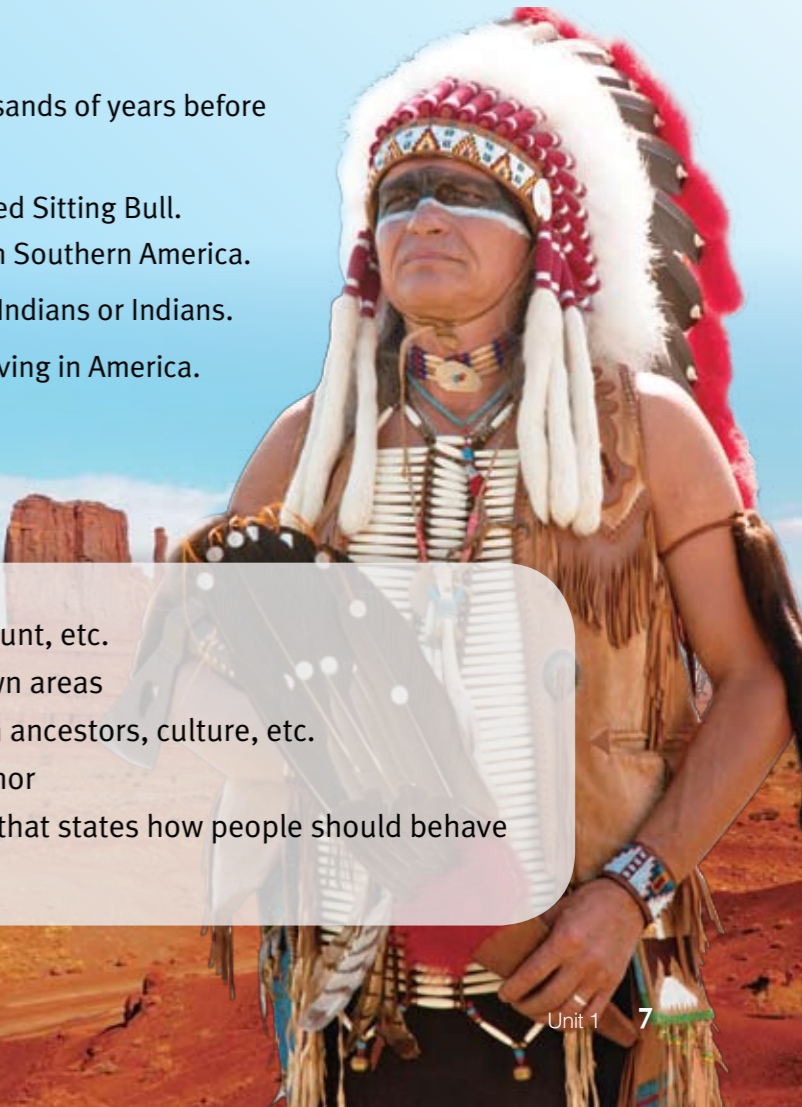

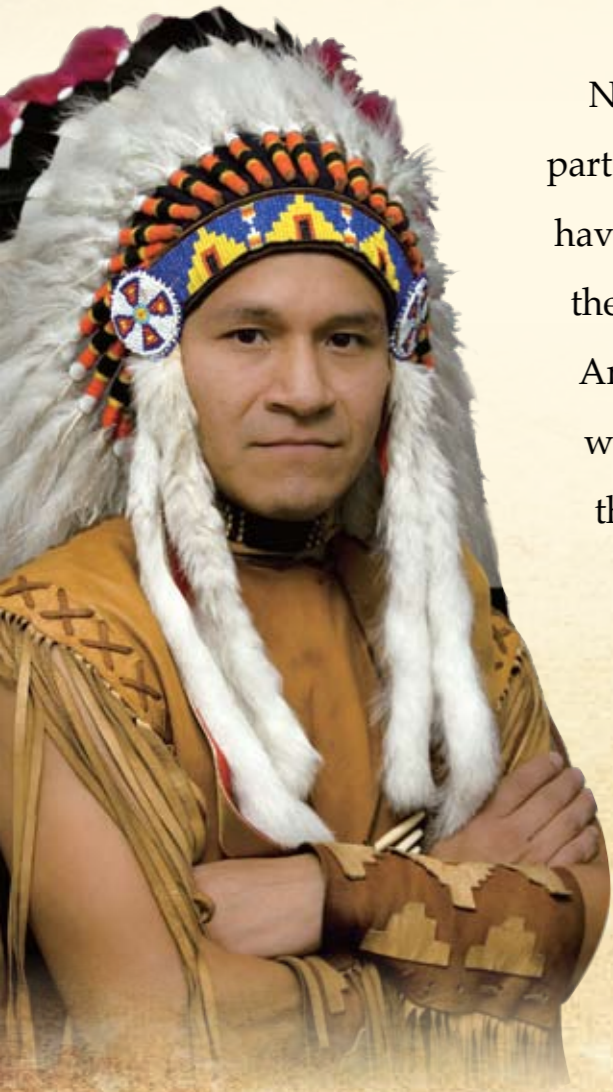
Native Americans

Before the arrival of European explorers, Native Americans lived without much difficulty. Men hunted for food and protected their families. Women looked after the children and cooked. Each **tribe** had a strong sense of **pride**. Everyone worked hard to

make sure life was good. Families slept together in their tipis, or tents. Native Americans were strong and healthy.



The Metric System

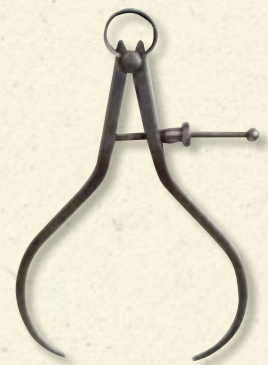
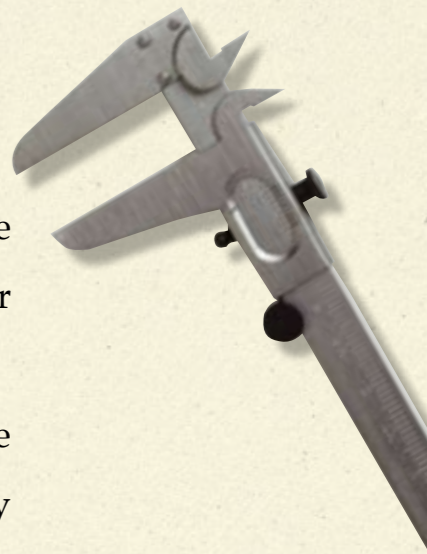


Have you ever wondered about the history of measurement? It is very difficult to say exactly when it began. At first, people said that one foot should equal the **length** of a man's foot. However, it was quickly realized that foot sizes were different. This caused a lot of confusion. There was a need for a standard system of measurement.

In 1799, the French **created** a standard system of measurement called the **metric system**. Rather than using body parts, this system uses fixed lengths. Today, almost every country in the world uses it. There is no need to worry about any changes. In the metric system, everything is in terms of

ten. 100 centimeters equals one meter, 1,000 meters equals one kilometer, and so on. This means that no matter how big or small something is, it can be measured easily.

Measurements have been around for a long time. Since there was no way to measure **accurately**, there were many problems. The metric system ended those problems. It is **simple** and **reliable**. And since it is a worldwide standard, things like travel and communication are possible for everyone.

Tigers and Lions



Have you ever seen lions or tigers at the zoo? Lions and tigers are amazing animals. They are both big cats. They have both been on earth for millions of years. Lions and tigers share many similarities, but there are also some differences between them.



The lion and the tiger are the largest cats to be found in the wild. Out of the two, tigers

are generally bigger than lions. They are both apex **predators**, meaning they have no natural predators of their own. Lions are mostly light-brown in color. However, tigers are orange with beautiful black stripes. Lions are social animals. They live and travel together in groups. Each group is called a **pride**. Prides can contain as many as 15 lions. In contrast, tigers are **solitary** animals. The male lion has a **mane**, while the male tiger does not. Although they are both **carnivores**, they do not hunt in the same way.
